P: We let other voices speak to us of fulfillment, hope and peace.C: We have been tempted to turn away from the truth you offer us.We have doubted your presence, your power and your promise.Have mercy on us, O God.

P: We have shut our ears to your call to love and serve others with the same compassionate love and service Christ offers us.


C: We have not been diligent in staying keenly aware of how we can be a source of comfort, hope and sustenance to those who suffer, or are in despair, or deprived of what they need to live. We have found security in protecting and preserving our abundant blessings. Have mercy on us, O God.

P: We misuse and abuse the role you have given us in and over creation.

C: We exploit and squander the earth's resources without inconveniencing ourselves with consideration for the sustainability of life in the future. We assume the power of gods, but fail to seek the wisdom of God in the use of our power, focusing too much on our satisfaction in this moment rather than comprehending the full scope of our actions. We privilege our lives over the lives of other creatures without respect for the depth of the interconnectedness of all life. Have mercy on us, O God.

P: We do not always own our own problems, nor do we take enough responsibility for working to solve them.

C: We scapegoat, we make excuses, we get distracted. We do not bring them to you and open ourselves to the Spirit's guidance through unexpected voices and resources. We become discontented because we resign to empty contentment. We default to following the norm rather than clinging to the distinction of being a Child of God. Hear us, O God, for your mercy is great.

<u>First Lesson</u>

Exodus 1

A fter many years of living in Egypt, Joseph (the one who was infamous for his many-colored or long-sleeved coat) died, and so did all his brothers, and every one of their generation. Yet, the Children of Israel, the descendants of Joseph's father, "bore fruit" - literally swarming across Egypt, and becoming exceedingly numerous - mighty in their numbers - until the land had filled up with them.

In time, a new king began to rule over Egypt. He did not know Joseph or remember the great deeds Joseph had done to keep Egypt from starving.

The new pharaoh said to his people, "Look, the Israelites are more numerous and more powerful than us. Come, let us use our wits against them or they will continue to multiply and swarm across our land! Then, in the event of a war, the Israelites may join our enemies and fight against us and escape from the land."

Therefore, the Egyptians set taskmasters over the Israelites to oppress them with forced labor. The Israelites built supply cities, Pithom and Rameses, for Pharaoh. But even as Egypt afflicted Israel, still Israel continued to multiply and burst out across all of Egypt. The Egyptians felt dread before the children of Israel. So, Egypt made the Children of Israel subservient with crushing labor, making their lives bitter with hard service with mortar and bricks and with every kind of field labor. The work was arduous and crushing.

The king of Egypt also said to the Hebrew midwives, one of whom was named Shiphrah and the other Puah, "When you act as midwives to the Hebrew women and see them on the birthstool, if it is a boy, kill him; but if it is a girl, she can live." But the midwives feared God and they did not do as the king of Egypt commanded them. Instead, they let the boys live.

So, the king of Egypt summoned the midwives and said to them, "Why have you done this? Why have you allowed the boys to live?"

The midwives said to Pharaoh, "Because the Hebrew women are not like the Egyptian women! The Israelite women are vigorous and give birth before the midwife gets to them."

So, God dealt well with the midwives; and the people multiplied and became very strong.

Ephesians 3

For this reason I bow my knees before the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth takes its name. <u>Gospel</u>

Luke 9

hen a great crowd had gathered and people from town after town came to him, Jesus told them this parable.

"A sower went out to sow his seed and as he sowed, some seed fell on the path and was trampled on, and the birds of the air ate it up. Some seed fell on the rocks and as it grew up, it withered from a lack of moisture. Some seed fell among the thorns, and the thorns grew with it and choked it. Some seed fell into good soil, and when it grew, it produced a hundredfold."

As he said this, he called out, "Let anyone with ears to hear, listen!"

Then his disciples asked him what this parable meant.

Jesus said, "To you it has been given to know the mysteries of the kingdom of God; but to others I speak in parables so that *'looking they may not perceive and listening they may not understand.'* [Is 6:9-10]

"Now this is what the parable is about: The seed is the Word of God. The seeds that fall on the path are those who have heard God's Word, but then the devil comes and takes away the Word from their hearts so that they may not believe or be saved. The seeds that fall on the rocks are those who, when they hear the Word, receive it with joy, but because they have no root they believe only for a while and, then, in a time of testing, they fall away. As for the seeds that fell among the thorns, these are the ones who hear God's Word, but as they go on their way, they are choked by the cares and riches and pleasures of life, and their fruit does not mature. But, as for the seeds that fall in the good soil, these are the ones who, when they hear the Word hold it tightly with an honest and good heart and bear fruit with patient endurance.


Offertory Prayer


A: Let us pray:
