5 Habits of Highly Effective Christians: Take the Gospel Perspective Bell Ringing & Prelude
Confession
P: Most holy and merciful God,
C: we confess to you and to one another, and before the whole company of heaven, that we have sinned by our fault, by our own fault, by our own most grievous fault, in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done and by what we have left undone.

P: We have not loved you with our whole heart, and mind, and strength. We diminish our respect and awe of You by not putting our relationship with you on the top of our priority list. We relegate You to being our god of convenient comfort rather than Creator of the Cosmos, and so we limit the power you have in our lives.

C: Have mercy on us, O God.

P: We let other voices and speak to us of fulfillment, hope and peace, tempting us to turn away from the truth you offer us. And so, we have doubted your presence, your power and your promise.

C: Have mercy on us, O God.

P: We have shut our ears to your call to love and serve others with the same compassionate love and service Christ offers us. We have not been diligent in staying keenly aware of how we can be a source of comfort, hope and sustenance to those who suffer, despair and are deprived of what they need. We have found security in protecting our abundant blessings.

C: Have mercy on us, O God.

P: We misuse and abuse the role you have given us in and over creation. We exploit and squander the earth's resources without inconveniencing ourselves with consideration for the sustainability of life in the future. We assume the power of gods, but fail in seeking the Wisdom of God in the use of our power, focusing too much on our satisfaction in this moment rather than comprehending the full scope of our actions. We privilege our lives over the lives of other creatures without respect for the depth of the interconnectedness of all life.

C: Have mercy on us, O God.

P: We do not always own our own problems, nor do we take enough responsibility for working to solve them. We scapegoat, we make excuses, we get distracted. We do not bring them to you and open ourselves to the Spirit's guidance through unexpected voices and resources. We become discontented because we resign to empty contentment. We default to following the norm rather than clinging to the distinction of being a Child of God.

C: Hear us, O God, for your mercy is great.

<u>Philippians 2</u>

If then there is any encouragement in Christ, any consolation from love, any fellowship in the Spirit, any compassion and sympathy . . . have the same evaluative point of view, the same love, be of one mind by sharing a singular evaluative point of view. Do not be motivated by selfish ambition or conceit, but, after a humble reflection on who you are, see that there is no reason you cannot lift up others in your eyes. Do not become so self-absorbed that you are not considering others! This is the evaluative point of view that was in Christ - so it should be your evaluative point of view, too. Our Christ was God, but he did not count being God of real value for his mission and goal, so he stepped away from the benefits of being God and undertook the life of a servant leader, like you and I, humbling himself as a human being and being obedient to the Father's will, going so far as to die a death on a cross. But, because Christ did all of this, God raised him up and gave him a name that is above all other names. Now, at the name of Jesus everything will bow down; everything heavenly, earthly and hellish. And every tongue will confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, giving glory to God the Father.
