5 Habits of Highly Effective Christians: Commitment to Compassion

Bell Ringing & Prelude

Confession

P: Most holy and merciful God,

C: we confess to you and to one another, and before the whole company of heaven, that we have sinned by our fault, by our own fault, by our own most grievous fault, in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done and by what we have left undone.

P: We have not loved you with our whole heart, and mind, and strength. We diminish our respect and awe of You by not putting our relationship with you on the top of our priority list. We relegate You to being our god of convenient comfort rather than Creator of the Cosmos, and so we limit the power you have in our lives.

C: Have mercy on us, O God.

P: We let other voices and speak to us of fulfillment, hope and peace, tempting us to turn away from the truth you offer us. And so, we have doubted your presence, your power and your promise.

C: Have mercy on us, O God.

P: We have shut our ears to your call to love and serve others with the same compassionate love and service Christ offers us. We have not been diligent in staying keenly aware of how we can be a source of comfort, hope and sustenance to those who suffer, despair and are deprived of what they need. We have found security in protecting our abundant blessings.

C: Have mercy on us, O God.

P: We misuse and abuse the role you have given us in and over creation. We exploit and squander the earth's resources without inconveniencing ourselves with consideration for the sustainability of life in the future. We assume the power of gods, but fail in seeking the Wisdom of God in the use of our power, focusing too much on our satisfaction in this moment rather than comprehending the full scope of our actions. We privilege our lives over the lives of other creatures without respect for the depth of the interconnectedness of all life.

C: Have mercy on us, O God.

P: We do not always own our own problems, nor do we take enough responsibility for working to solve them. We scapegoat, we make excuses, we get distracted. We do not bring them to you and open ourselves to the Spirit's guidance through unexpected voices and resources. We become discontented because we resign to empty contentment. We default to following the norm rather than clinging to the distinction of being a Child of God.

C: Hear us, O God, for your mercy is great.

First Lesson.

1 Peter 3

Everyone's goal in the community of the faithful must be to be: of one mind, sympathetic, having love for one another, compassionate, humble, not returning evil for evil or abuse for abuse, but returning blessing, because this is what you have been called to do so you might also inherit a blessing.

For:

"Those who want to live, love, and those desiring to see good days, keep their tongues from evil and their lips from speaking deceit; but let them turn away from evil and do good; seek peace and pursue it.

For the eyes of the Lord are on the righteous, and his ears are open to their prayer.


But the face of the Lord is against those who do evil."

The fear of the unfaithful is not your fear, and may it never be your anxiety! Make the Lord Christ holy in your hearts. Always be ready with good reasoning for anyone who asking you about the Word in which you hope. But respond to them with gentleness and fear, having a good conscience, so that if you are being slandered, they will be put to shame by their mistreatment of you for your good conduct in Christ. For suffering in doing good, if willed by the Will of God, is better than suffering for doing evil. For Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, so that you may approach God . . .

Gospel Luke 7

Soon after entering the area of Capernaum, Jesus went to a town called Nain, and his disciples and a large crowd went with him. As Jesus came near the gate of the town, behold, the dead only son of his mother was being carried out. She was a widow. With her was a large crowd from the town.

And having seen her, the Lord had compassion for her and said to her, "Do not weep."

And having come forward, he touched the bier, and the bearers stood still.

And he said, "Young man, I say to you, be raised!"

And the dead sat up and began to speak, and Jesus gave him to his mother.

Fear overcame everyone and they glorified God, saying, "A great prophet has been raised up among us!" and "God has looked upon his people!"

In that hour Jesus healed many people of diseases, plagues, and evil spirits, and had given sight to many who were blind. And Jesus answered them.

"Go and tell John what you have seen and heard:

the blind receive their sight, [Is 61:1]

the lame walk,

the lepers* are cleansed,

the deaf hear, [Is 35:5]

the dead are raised, [Is 26:19]

the poor have good news brought to them. [Is 61:1]

And blessed is anyone who takes no offense at me."
