



First Lesson Wisdom 13

Infortunate people who see the beauty of the world and search for God but fall short in finding him end up setting their hopes on dead things. These are people who give the name "gods" to the work of human hands, like gold and silver made into statues and charms, or like a useless chunk of stone or crystal chiseled and cut even by ancient hands. It is like the skilled woodcutter who may saw down a tree that is easy to handle and he skillfully strip off all its bark, and then with fine workmanship forms a very useful bowl that can be useful in daily life, burning the

shavings to prepare a meal and eating a fine meal because of his work. But, afterward, he finds a scrap of wood he had thrown away because it was not useful for much of anything - a crooked stick that was full of knots. However, the woodcutter takes this useless stick and carefully carves it in his free time, shaping it with skills that were not used to make useful things at work, but skills he has acquired while having nothing else to do. So he carves a man, or a little animal, and he gives it a nice coat of red paint to cover up the knots and other blemishes on its surface. Then he a little space for it on his shelf and sets it up there carefully, making certain that it does not fall off because it is only a statute and cannot keep itself up on the shelf — it is in need of help to stay put. Still, when the woodcutter prays about his possessions and his marriage and his children he is not ashamed to address this lifeless thing. He even appeals to this for health from this thing that is weak. He prays for life to a thing that is dead. For aid he entreats a thing that is utterly inexperienced. For a safe and successful journey he prays to a thing that cannot even take a single step. For earning a living and having adequate work and good success with his craft he asks for strength from a thing whose hands have no strength at all.

Second Lesson Romans 1

C t. Paul writes that the wrath of God is shown from heavens against all the ungodliness and unrighteousness of those people who suppress the truth about God by their unrighteousness. God shows his wrath because he, himself, has shown them the way to know him. From the very creation itself even the invisible aspects of God can be perceived, his eternal power and his essence. This can be understood from the things God made, so, these people are without any defense - they should know God! But, even though they did know the truth about God, they still did not glorify God as God or give thanks to God. Instead, they focused only on themselves and then their misunderstanding hearts were darkened. And so, while claiming that they were wise they were actually foolish. They exchanged the glory of the immortal God for an image of a mortal human being and of birds and of four-footed animals and of reptiles. Because they decided to do this, God handed them over to the desires of their hearts, into their impurity, to their own dishonoring of their bodies. This happened to anyone who exchanged God's truth for a lie and worshiped and offered cultic service to what the Creator had created rather than to the One God who is the Creator - who is blessed into the ages! Amen!

Athanasian Creed

Whoever wants to be saved should above all cling to the catholic faith. Whoever does not guard it whole and inviolable will doubtless perish eternally. Now this is the catholic faith:

We worship one God in trinity and the Trinity in unity, neither confusing the persons nor dividing the divine being. For the Father is one person, the Son is another, and the Spirit is still another. But the deity of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit is one, equal in glory, coeternal in majesty. What the Father is, the Son is, and so is the Holy Spirit, Uncreated is the Father; uncreated is the Son; uncreated is the Spirit. The Father is infinite; the Son is infinite; the Holy Spirit is infinite. Eternal is the Father; eternal is the Son; eternal is the Spirit: And yet there are not three eternal beings, but one who is eternal; as there are not three uncreated and unlimited beings, but one who is uncreated and unlimited. Almighty is the Father; almighty is the Son; almighty is the Spirit: And yet there are not three almighty beings, but one who is almighty. Thus, the Father is God; the Son is God; the Holy Spirit is God: And yet there are not three gods, but one God. Thus, the Father is Lord; the Son is Lord; the Holy Spirit is Lord: And yet there are not three lords, but one Lord. As Christian truth compels us to acknowledge each distinct person as God and Lord, so catholic religion forbids us to say that there are three gods or lords. The Father was neither made nor created nor begotten; the Son was neither made nor created but was alone begotten of the Father; the Spirit was neither made nor created but is proceeding from the Father and the Son. Thus, there is one Father, not three fathers; one Son, not three sons; one Holy Spirit, not three spirits. And in this Trinity, no one is before or after, greater or less than the other; but all three persons are in themselves, coeternal and coequal; and so we must worship the Trinity in unity and the one God in three persons. Whoever wants to be saved should think thus about the Trinity.

It is necessary for eternal salvation that one also faithfully believe that our Lord Jesus became flesh. For this is the true faith that we believe and confess: That our Lord Jesus Christ, God's Son, is both God and man. He is God, begotten before all worlds from the being of the Father, and he is man, born in the world from the being of his mother—existing fully as God, and fully as man with a rational soul and a human body; equal to the Father in divinity, subordinate to the Father in humanity. Although he is God and man, he is not divided, but is one Christ. He is united because God has taken humanity into himself; he does not transform deity into humanity. He is completely one in the unity of his person, without confusing his natures. For as the rational soul and body are one person, so the one Christ is God and man. He suffered death for our salvation. He descended into hell

and rose again from the dead. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead. At his coming all people shall rise bodily to give an account of their own deeds. Those who have done good will enter eternal life, those who have done evil will enter eternal fire. This is the catholic faith. One cannot be saved without believing this firmly and faithfully.


